Please check that you are in the catchment area for registering with the surgery on our website, and complete the registration forms. Please supply us with as much information as you can, as it may take some time to obtain your medical records from your previous GP.

If you are on repeat medication(s), please attach your repeat slip from your previous GP to your registration forms. If you are set up so your prescriptions are sent automatically to a pharmacy, please inform them if you want that to stop now that you are registering with Woodlands Primary Care.

If more information is needed regarding filling in the forms, please read the information on page two, or go to our website; www.woodlandssurgerysidcup.nhs.uk.

If you are registering with adult registration forms (aged 16 or over), please provide one proof of address - dated within the past 3 months - from the list below.

This must have your current address on.

- Bank / Building Society Statement
- Letters from Benefits Agency / Benefit Book

Patients aged 16 years and over must have their own forms and proof of address.

If you are registering a baby or a child, please attach a photocopy of their Birth Certificate or Red Book, or Passport for older children.

Medical Research Data Collection

The staff at this practice record information about you and your health so that you can receive the right care and treatment. We need to record this information, together with the details of the care you receive, because it may be needed if we see you again.

We may use some of this information for other reasons, for example, to help us to protect the health of the general public generally, to plan for the future, to train staff and to carry out medical and other health research for the benefit of everyone.

These studies may be performed by academic researchers or commercial companies amongst others. However, no researcher has access to your full details such as your name and address, initials or your full date of birth. The researchers are not given information about the GP nor the practice name, address or post code.

If anything to do with the research would require that you provide additional information about yourself, you will be contacted to see if you are willing to take part: You will not be identified in any published results.

Bexley Linked Care

NHS Bexley Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) has been working alongside clinicians, practice managers and patient representatives to link together patient information and data to ensure patients receive the best possible care.

From December 2015, some doctors and nurses in Bexley may ask patients if they give their permission (consent) to the clinician treating them to have access to their GP patient record.

This includes doctors and nurses at Queen Mary's Hospital and Erith Hospital Urgent Care Centres (UCCs) and GP out-of-hours services. It also includes doctors and nurses at Bexley Community Clinics. These clinics are provided from a Bexley GP practice setting and offer specialist services such as anticoagulation, dermatology, cardiology clinics and diagnostics, minor surgery, endoscopy, vasectomy and erectile dysfunction.

A GP patient record is the best, most complete and up-to-date health record and includes any treatment patients are receiving. Every resident registered with a GP practice has an online GP patient record, containing information and dates about their medical history. Up until now, this patient record could only be viewed by the registered practice.

Summary Care Record

Summary Care Records (SCR) is an electronic record of important patient information, created from GP medical records. They can be seen and used by authorised staff in other areas of the health and care system involved in the patient's direct care.

Your Summary Care Record is a short summary of your GP medical records. It tells other health and care staff who care for you about the medicines you take and your allergies.

This means they can give you better care if you need health care away from your usual doctor's surgery: in an emergency, when you're on holiday, when your surgery is closed, at out-patient clinics or when you visit a pharmacy.

Organ Donation

Organ donation in England has moved to an 'opt out' system from 20th May 2020. This means that all adults in England will be considered to have agreed to be an organ donor when they die, unless they have recorded a decision not to donate, or are in one of the excluded groups.
